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Course Overview:

This course provides a basic and broad introduction to U.S. foreign policy and international relations theory. The course covers classic approaches to studying international relations and foreign policy and deals with issues areas ranging from military intervention, terrorism, and international law to international trade, finance, and environmental cooperation.

Course Structure and Policies:

1. **Readings:** The following book is required for this course and available from the University Coop Bookstore. All other readings will be made available electronically through Blackboard. You are responsible for completing the readings for the class session for which the readings are listed.

Note that this is the 10th edition. If you use an older edition you may be missing some chapters or other material.

2. **Foreign Policy Simulation:** A portion of your class grade will be based on your participation and performance in a cooperative foreign policy simulation. The simulation software is called *Statecraft*. Participation requires a subscription, which costs \$30. During the simulation you will be sorted into “country” groups according to a foreign policy attitudes quiz. Once in these groups, you will meet each week and make decisions within a simulated world. During the weeks we run the simulation I will normally reserve class time on Fridays for meeting face to face within your group and to negotiate deals with other groups. This in class time is very important, and everyone is expected to attend.

Grading for the simulation will be based on two quizzes you will take at the beginning of the simulation which cover the *Statecraft* rules and instruction manual, short weekly write-ups analyzing your group’s decisions and your

specific role (e.g. president, national security advisor, etc.), and your country's performance in the simulation. The manual outlines the various awards your group can attain which will result in extra points for your simulation grade.

As with any group assignment, you will be expected to contribute to the decision-making of your group and behave in a professional and friendly manner. Group members who neglect their duties and do not attend face to face meetings will face grade deductions.

3. **Communication:** I will normally post course announcements on blackboard, but you are responsible for any and all announcements made *during* the class period. It is a good idea to check with friends if you miss class. Otherwise, contact me if you have questions or concerns.
4. **Deadlines, Exams, absences:** *Absolutely no late assignments will be accepted or alternate exam arrangements made, with the exception of an illness, a university-approved function, or death in the immediate family that clearly interferes with your ability to finish the assignment on time.* Documentation is required for each of the above and you are required to inform me before the deadline or scheduled exam time. Acceptable documentation for illness must come from health services or a doctor and demonstrate that you are physically unable to attend exam or complete an assignment. Failure to notify me will result in a zero for the assignment or exam.
5. **Class conduct:**
 - a. *Technology:* Please silence and put away all electronic devices prior to the start of class. If you are seen with a cell phone or other electronic device during an exam, you will automatically receive a zero, **no exceptions**. Laptops may be used for notes. If you are seen using a laptop for non-class related purposes, you will be given one warning.
